Hiring of Dual Deputy Coroners Discussed at Fiscal Court Meeting

The Carlisle County Fiscal Court met in regular session on September 21, 2010, and the meeting began with the approval of the previous meeting's minutes and the welcoming of guests which included Mike Lawrence, candidate for Kentucky House of Representatives First District. Lawrence told the group in attendance that if elected First District Representative he would attend fiscal court and city council meetings in the First District because that is how the office should be ran. "As a member of the House of Representatives you should be attending meetings such as this to know what the people of your district need and you can be armed with the information to go to the House and ask them for what your people need. I

humbly ask you and the people of Carlisle County for their vote and support in November," Lawrence said. Lawrence will be facing incumbent Steven Rudy in the November General Election.

It was then time for the fiscal court to get down to county business, as Wayne Floyd reported that everything was going well with the ambulance service and that there were no issues to report.

The coroner's report was next with Carlisle County Coroner Steve Freeman in attendance. Freeman recently relieved Deputy Coroner John Curtis of his duties as deputy coroner and asked the fiscal court on Tuesday to hire Diven Vickers and Laura Pender as deputy coroner while splitting the pay of \$200. Freeman told the fiscal court that two deputies would increase coverage across the county and benefit the county in the long run. Deputy coroners are used in the event that the Coroner is out of town or away for training.

Carlisle County Judge Executive Greg Terry was receptive to the idea of two deputy coroners but warned Freeman that hiring two deputy coroners would set a precedent for years to come. Terry was also concerned about having the county to pay for two individuals to be trained, as both deputies will have to receive 18 hours of training within a year. The cost for training, lodging and fees for classes were estimated to be around \$1,500 to the county. Free-

man told Carlisle County Judge Executive Terry that the benefits of having two deputy coroners and the coverage they would provide to the county would far outweigh the costs of training. Judge Executive Terry told Freeman that County Attorney Michael Hogancamp would look over the legal issues concerning the hires and the fiscal court would render a decision at the October 1st fiscal court meeting.

Carlisle County DES and Solid Waste Director Missy Rowland was away for training, but the final totals for the dumpster grant program that recently wrapped up came in and the county used \$16,000 of the \$20,000 that was available for the grant. Judge Executive Terry said that the county will look into having a program for clean up next year for two weeks possibly since this program went over so well.

In the jail report, Carlisle County Jailer Ronnie Owens reported that there were two inmates in the Hickman County Correctional Facility and two inmates in the Ballard County Jail.

In the road report chipping and sealing continues in Milburn and the new timber bridge will be opened in the upcoming weeks on Alex Griffin's road.

In the 911 report, 911 Director Josh Glover was unable to attend due to medical issues but he gave Judge Executive Terry a report. Glover reported that everything was

going well within the 911 department. This week the Department of Justice will be auditing the Carlisle County 911 and Dispatch Center to verify that all employees' background checks have been completed. Glover said that there will be no problem in complying.

Under new business the treasurer's report, county clerk's report for August, claims and transfers were all accepted.

Carlisle County Middle School student Clifton Turner was next discussed. Turner was the young man who was selected to attend a leadership conference in Washington D.C. Judge Executive Terry encouraged all who can please send in a donation to Clifton so that he will be able to attend this leadership conference. A fund has been set up at First Kentucky Bank in Bardwell for Clifton.

The final item of business before adjournment was Shiloh Baptist Church. Wayne Floyd reported that Shiloh Baptist has made arrangements to where in the event of an ice storm, their community center can be used as a warming center. Shiloh will be able to accommodate up to 250 people with food, water and shelter for four days. Judge Executive Terry said that Shiloh will be put on the list to be designated as a warming center.

With there being no further county business to conduct the September 21, 2010, Carlisle County Fiscal Court meeting adjourned.

Grant Allows WK&T to Bring High Speed Internet to all of Carlisle County

Once completed, the fiber network will carry broadband at speeds up to 20 mbps, rivaling anything available in urban areas. WK&T expects to double its number of data subscribers, with almost 90 percent on broadband at speeds many times higher than those available now.

The benefits of the new network will be both immediate and far into the future. The technology will enable the high-speed applications of today ("on demand" entertainment, smart home, home monitoring, etc.) as well as those not yet even invented. Fiber, which lets data travel at the speed of light, is virtually unlimited in bandwidth capacity, and "future proofs"

new applications as they come into existence.

Broadband is essential for competing in the global economy and will greatly invigorate local economic growth. It also facilitates information sharing and multiple networks in our local institutions, which will enhance our area's ability to respond to emergencies.

The project is estimated to create 160 new jobs and be complete within the government-mandated three years. Work starts now to bring the latest technology to our cooperative members.

In addition, WK&T plans to create educational partnerships in order to develop courses and curricula for extensive broadband training and education. To ensure full utilization of the fiber network, trainees will help deliver the message of broadband benefits and assist the learning curve of those new to the many Internet applications.

The cooperative is based on working together and partnering. This is the foundational characteristic of WK&T. As a non-profit cooperative for nearly 60 years, its owners are its customers. The corporate goal has remained the same since 1951 -- to provide the best technology available at affordable prices to all members. The transformation into fiber -- and the pledge to offer a wide variety of broadband applications and affordable service bundles -- is simply the latest manifestation of that ongoing commitment.

Carlisle Countians in the communities of Cunningham, Kirbyton, Lowes, Beulah, Thomasville and Fancy Farm will all be able to take advantage of this new technology after the project is complete.

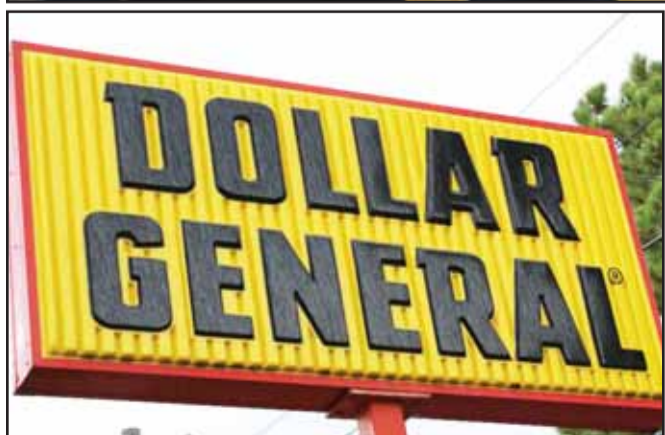
Dollar General Store Awards CCES \$5,000 Grant for Literacy

Cooperative Extension Gets Physical with 2nd Sunday Event



The Carlisle County Cooperative Extension Service in collaboration with several local organizations is planning to stage a 2nd Sunday event on October 10 from 2 p.m. – 4 p.m. in Bardwell. 2nd Sunday is an event coordinated by the UK Cooperative Extension Service through a partnership with UK HealthCare, local governments and other community partners. It encourages Kentuckians of all ages to participate in a variety of forms of physical activity in the comfort of their local environment.

As 2nd Sunday coordinators,

UK Cooperative Extension Service agents in Family and Consumer Sciences, 4-H Youth Development, and Agriculture and Natural Resources will be working with community partners to make people aware of the need to incorporate physical activity into their daily lives as a means of maintaining optimum health.

Local activities will be set up on Front Street in Bardwell and include a corn hole tournament with cash prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place, a geocaching scavenger hunt, walking and bicycling areas, inflatables for younger kids, Hoopercise (exercise with hula hoops), and parachute games. All activities are free.

There will be a variety of prizes given away including bicycle helmets, a one month membership to Energy Fitness in Paducah, a child's bicycle, an adult's bicycle and as well as 2nd Sunday T-shirts. You must be present to

win. In case of inclement weather, the event will be moved to the Bardwell Baptist Church Christian Outreach Center Gymnasium.

"The Cooperative Extension Service is ideally positioned to facilitate a project like Second Sunday, that requires grassroots organization at the county level combined with statewide coordination," said UK Dean of the College of Agriculture Scott Smith. "I am delighted that we are a key leader of this partnership that is so visibly promoting health and wellness for the Commonwealth."

For many years, Kentucky has had one of the highest obesity rates in the country. According to a new report by the Trust for America's Health and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, Kentucky has the seventh-highest obesity rate in the nation at 29 percent and the fourth-highest percentage of overweight youth at 37.1 percent. Obesity

has been linked to chronic diseases such as heart disease and diabetes.

2nd Sunday is a prime opportunity for Kentuckians to display their resolve in remedying these statistics and in turn improving the health of all in the state. State organizers hope this is a start for community members to recognize their available resources for physical activity and make efforts to promote these resources to their neighbors, friends and family.

This is the third year for this statewide event, and more than 12,000 people in 70 counties participated in 2008. In 2009 over 50,000 were active at Second Sunday events and this year is projected to be even larger, as 114 counties are planning to participate. Other work that has been completed on the courthouse includes metal stud walls on the 1st and 2nd floor being 99% complete. Drywall on the 2nd floor is 90% complete. Drywall on the 1st

floor is 50% complete.

The window frames and glass for the 2nd floor is near completion. The sprinkler line installation is 99% complete on both floors. Duct work is continuing. The back concrete road and apron have been poured. The sewer extension project is 50% complete.

The Carlisle County Courthouse is slated to be finished around early 2011.

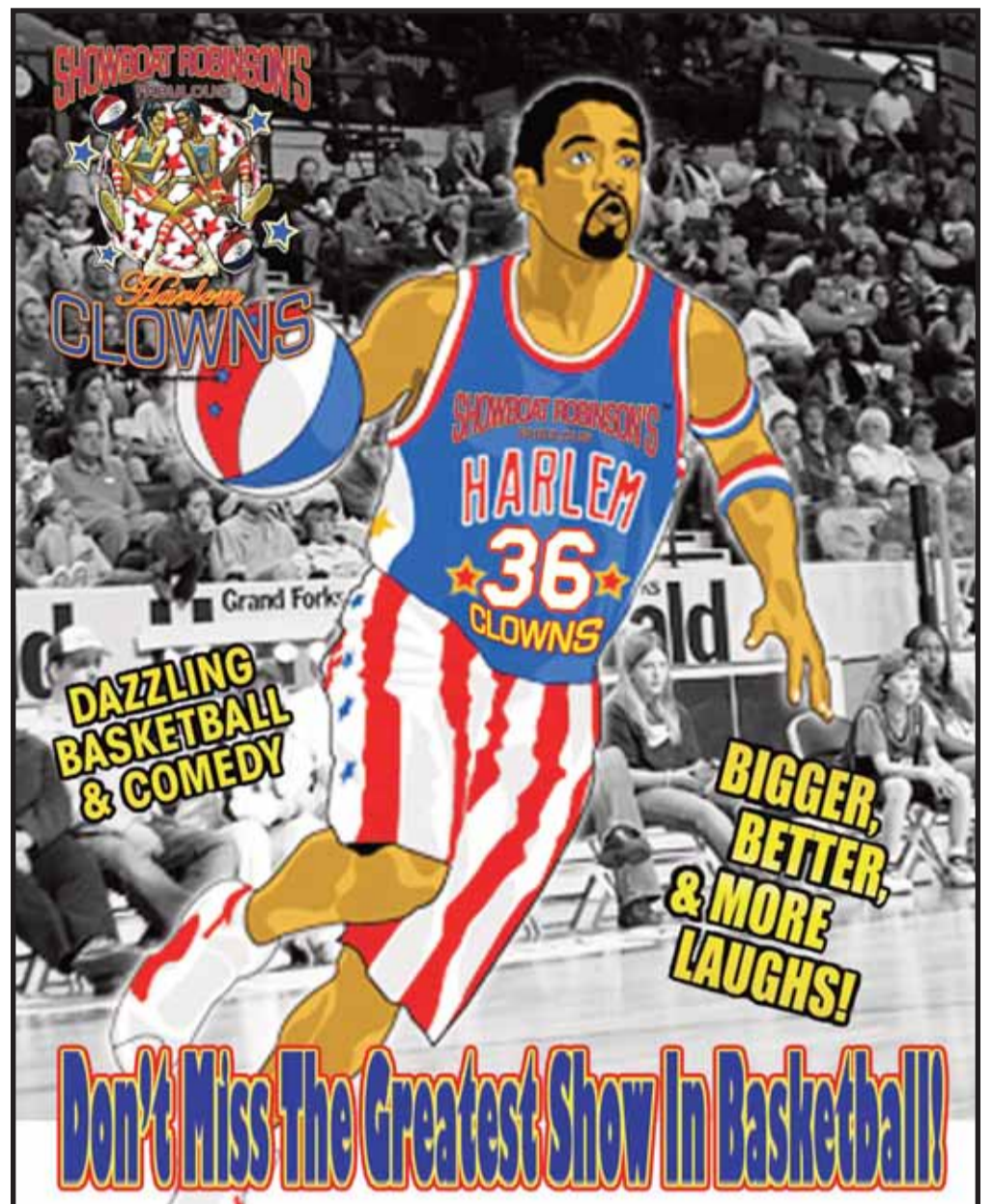

Federal programs report: We continue to use federal funds to support instruction as much as possible in Carlisle County. This year, Title I and Title II funds are going to support teachers and instructional coaches in the elementary and middle schools that work with students in pull out programs in Math, Science and Reading. They also support parent involvement programs as well as funds for homeless students and travel to professional meetings. Title VI rural money has provided extra books for the libraries of these schools as well as instructional tools for teachers such as document cameras and Mimio smart software. There are several other areas where federal dollars are used in small amounts to aid in instruction. We follow all federal guidelines when using federal money and we try to ease the burden on the general fund as much as possible by the implementation of programs paid for by federal dollars.

Preschool report: Preschool teachers and assistants attended professional development trainings this summer on brain research and development, Integrating Mathematics throughout the Preschool Day,

Lively Learners, Bullying in the Preschool Classroom, IEP training, and Applied Behavior Analysis. Preschool teacher Heather Pearson completed a twelve week intensive American Sign Language training.

Preschool is off to a great start this year. Enrollment at this time consists of 78 three and four year old students with two additional students transitioning into preschool from the home intervention Part C First Steps program in November and January.

Emily Scheer was hired in June as a preschool teacher. Emily has an elementary education degree and a special education degree from Murray State University. Preschool teacher Amanda Williams has accepted a position as Project Coordinator for the Middle Tennessee State University Community and Home-Based Early Intervention Program. Ms Williams will be relocating to Murfreesboro, Tennessee. Her last day will be Friday, September 3rd. Amber Cates will be filling in for Ms. Williams as the interviewing process takes place. Ashley Haynes has been hired as the new family service worker for Carlisle County. Ashley has a social work degree from Murray State University and completed her internship last year at Ballard County Preschool Head Start.

Recycling efforts have in-

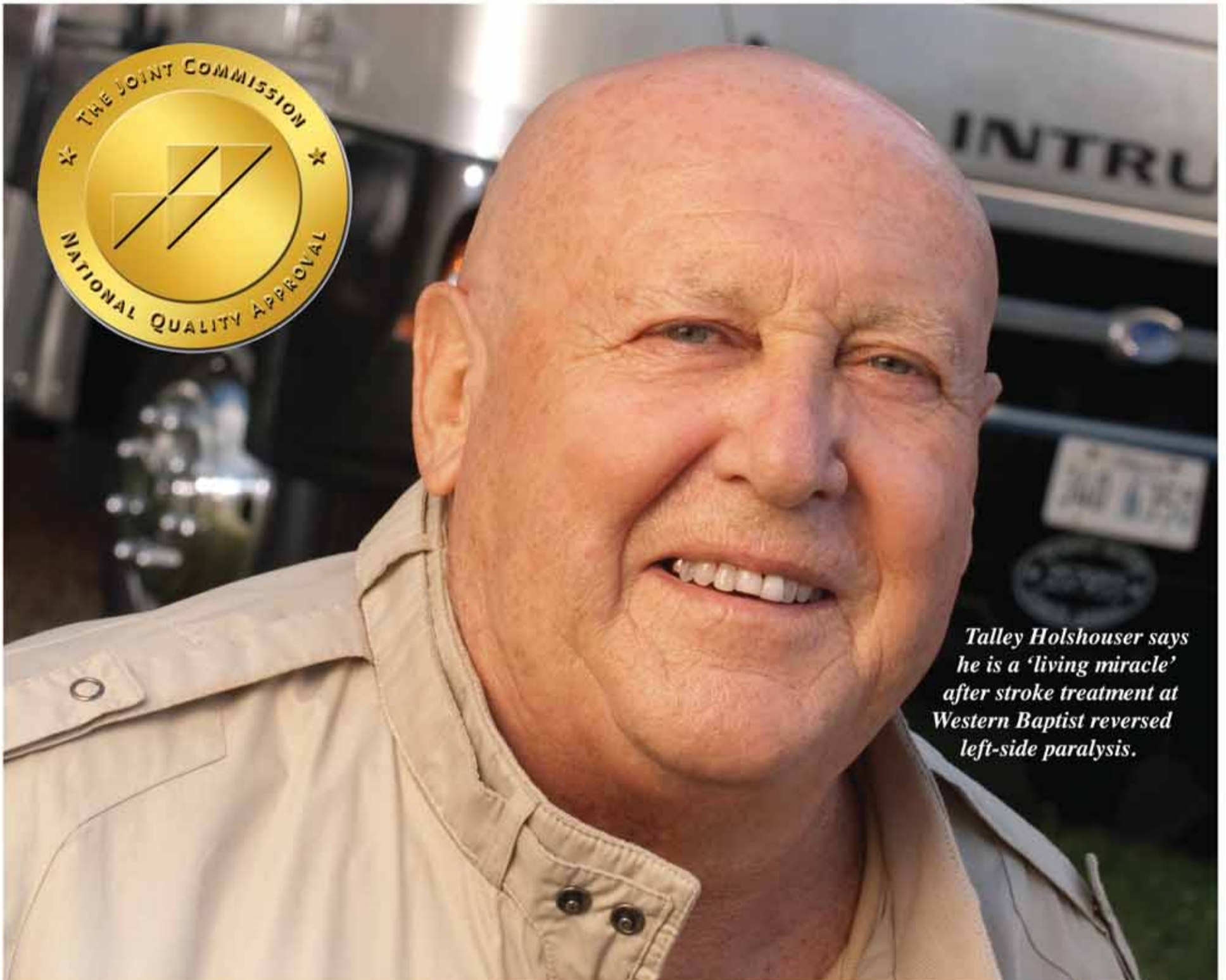
